HOW TO GET THERE

From Benamahoma take the A-372 east towards Grazalema. After 2 km we find the recreation area of Llanos del Campo, right at the start of the trail.



PARKING

There is a carpark with some 30 places at the start of the trail in the recreation area.



PUBLIC TRANSPORT




A DENSE FOREST

The Mediterranean climate is characterised by mild, wet winters and hot, dry summers, although its main feature is the presence of a period of several months of drought, followed by a rainy season. The lack of rainfall, together with the high temperatures, entails conditions of high water demand for plants, which have various adaptations to mitigate this. Some of them have small leaves that minimise water evaporation and are covered with white, woolly hairs that insulate them from extreme temperatures and reflect the sun's rays, thus avoiding heat absorption as much as possible.



Over the course of the route we can admire the Mediterranean forest and its scrubland, with plentiful holm oaks, gall oaks, carob trees, alders, sarsaparillas, mastic and palmettos, among others.

Along with vultures, we can observe an extensive array of birds linked to these wooded areas like blue tits, great tits, chaffinches, short-toed treecreepers, the Eurasian nuthatch, Eurasian jays, woodpeckers, long-tailed tits and firecrests.



Opposite the recreation area, the Llanos del Campo in Benamahoma, this comfortable path is ideal for a walk for the family.

We discover the dense Mediterranean forest, populated by animal and vegetation species, plains where wheat was grown and the cultural legacy of the Muslim era with important sites like the castle of Aznalmara.

Through the forest to the clearing

A sign opposite the recreation area (see [1] on the map) located on the road between El Bosque with Grazalema, a couple of kilometres from Benamahoma, describes the itinerary we are going to cover.

After passing a metal gate (please close behind you, a rule to be followed on this and all other trails) we continue a few hundred metres on the path between holm oaks and carob trees [2] until we reach a track that leads down to the left which we stick with for the rest of the route.



Following the landmarks of the trail and in a few minutes we arrive in Llanos del Berral [3].

These were cultivated fields until quite recently, and remain as a witness to an old era [4]. This site is also the source of the Charcones stream which collects the waters of the Sierra del Albarracín and disgorges towards the Tavizna valley. From Los Llanos del Berral we can make out the Sierra del Pinar massif, with its abrupt relief.

Views of the castle of Aznalmara

In these mountains we can find the highest peaks of the province of Cádiz, of which El Torreón is the highest.



We continue south through the plain, and take a trail towards Tavizna. There is a slight descent between century-old gall oaks, witness to the traditional activities of this country, such as coaling, shepherding and bee-keeping.

Our attention is drawn to the gall bushes and gall oaks, not to be confused with their fruit; the chestnut. This is a defence mechanism the trees possess against stinging from certain wasps. Galls are rich in tannins and are



used in artesian leather making as they react with certain proteins present in animals skins to achieve increased resistance to heat, rotting by water and microbe attacks.

Carrying on, after passing a gate, we can admire the panoramic views [5] in the direction or the castle of Tavizna or Aznalmara, a vestige of these mountains' medieval past.

Over the course of the route, we might be surprised by the density of the forest or deer or roebuck darting to a hiding place after detecting our presence.

The Los Llanos del Campo recreation area also marks the start of the El Tesorillo and Arroyo del Descansadero trails, both short scenic treks. Things to do in Benamahoma itself include a visit to the Eco-Museum of Water, a space housed in an old mill, dedicated to this precious resource.
