A Network for Sustainable Development

The Andalusian Network of Protected Natural Areas (RENPA) covers an area of almost 3 million hectares, 32.3% of the region, making it one of the largest and most diverse in Europe. A living and fragile territory where visitors can get to know it, interpret it, enjoy it and walk through it while appreciating and helping in a practical way to its conservation, without degrading the environment and having a positive impact on the local communities. We are talking about ecotourism. Are you in?



Dehesas of Sierra Morena



The northern strip of Andalusia is mostly hollowed out forest, transformed by humans since prehistoric times. A generous landscape, domesticated for centuries, where sustainable development is evident through traditional exploitation such as the extraction of cork, Iberian pork products, game, honey, aromatic herbs, firewood, chestnuts, mushrooms... and, of course, ecotourism.

This is a breeding area for the majestic Iberian imperial eagle and the solemn black vulture, an area of presence and potential expansion of the Iberian lynx, a paradise for small and medium-sized birds that in spring display their trills and exhibitions, *dehesas* where in autumn there are breathtaking concerts of bellowing and trumpeting cranes... the offer is endless.

Contemplate the sky from this privileged Starlight Reserve, stand in awe of the fabulous Sierra Norte Geopark, learn the ancestral secrets of the production of cured meats, cheeses and liqueurs, lose yourself in the largest Biosphere Reserve in Andalusia. In short, discover this unique habitat with the specialised vision of nature guides from the natural parks that make up this territory.

The Sierra Nevada is home to the highest peaks of the Iberian Peninsula, with unique plant and insect species. The activity of its people has given rise over time to an intricate network of roads and irrigation channels that run from north to south and from east to west, like the arteries that irrigate a living organism.

Among the thickest forests in Andalusia, the second largest natural park in Europe, the Sierras de Cazorla, Segura y las Villas, can also be found. This one, together with the Sierra de Castril, is once again home to the majestic flight of the bearded vulture. This formidable forest mass is completed by the Sierra Mágina and Sierra de Baza, the crags of which are home to other large birds of prey such as the golden eagle and the Bonelli's eagle.

Visit these mountains in any season of the year, whether on foot, by bike or off-road vehicle, thanks to the authorised companies that offer you authentic ecotourism experiences to capture the deep essence of these lands.



Inland, coastal and marsh wetlands

Wet Andalusia spills over into the marshes of Isla Cristina, Odiel, Barbate, Bahía de Cádiz, the lagoons of southern Córdoba and Cádiz, Padul, Fuente de Piedra... and, of course, Doñana. Liquid mirrors in which countless aquatic species such as spoonbills, white-headed ducks and ospreys come to look at themselves. An oasis of life in a thirsty land that every year burns with thousands of flamingos to rise from the ashes, like a phoenix.

From the astonishing Rompido spit in the province of Huelva to Tarifa, passing through Doñana, Bolonia and Barbate, there are long golden sandy beaches, rocky reefs, paradisiacal coves, moving dunes and flysch... It is a coastline as diverse as is spectacular. Be amazed by the iconic Tómbolo de Trafalgar or the imposing cliffs of La Breña, the look-out post for Barbary pirates.

In the Strait of Gibraltar, enjoy whalewatching and the thousands of birds that cross it every year on their migratory routes between Europe and Africa, a continent that you can contemplate on the horizon just as they did from the Roman city of Baetulo Claudio, the remains and views of which are not to be missed.

Want more excitement? Trails will help you on your way, observatories will make you invisible and, with a good nature guide, the experience will be unforgettable.

In any case, please contact the visitor centre, information point or ecomuseum for help in organising your visit.

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
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When the mountain dissolves with water and time, an astonishing catalogue of unique geological formations emerges, such as the gypsum caves of Sorbas, the Bailón river ravine in the Sierras Subbéticas or the limestone bolts and columns

in the Torcal de Antequera. Landscapes of fantasy where nature's creativity overflowed all imaginable limits. And in the midst of them, as silent witnesses of those distant eras, there are hidden spectacular fossils that you can find with the help of guides specialised in interpreting geological heritage.

But if we are talking about magical forests, it is essential to immerse ourselves in the venerable Spanish firs of the Sierra de las Nieves, Sierra de Grazalema and Sierra Bermeja.

Experience this unique forest in the company of local monitors, finding out traditions and ancestral trades that are still carried out here, such as cork harvesting and mycotourism, which are deeply rooted in the territory and will delight the true ecotourist.
