

HOW TO GET THERE

You can get there from the A-45 motorway (exit km 40), taking the road from Aguilar de la Frontera to Puente Genil until km 4 (A- 304). 4 (A- 304) and continue along this road, from where you can see the recreational area of Villares de Zóñar. About two kilometres from the start, you will come to the Laguna de Zóñar Visitor Centre. The facility is located at a distance of approximately four kilometres from Aguilar.





LAGUNA DE ZÓÑAR (ZOÑAR LAGOON)

The Zóñar Lagoon is located in the municipality of Aguilar de la Frontera. It forms part of the system of wetlands in the south of the province of Cordoba, together with the Rincón, Amarga, Los Jarales, Tíscar and Salobral lagoons. At 37 hectares, it is the largest of them all and contains the most water. In periods of high rainfall, it can reach depths of up to 16m. For this reason, although its popular name is "Zóñar lagoon", it actually behaves ecologically like a lake, the deepest in Andalusia.

Surrounded by reed beds, pastures and olive groves, Zóñar is basically an area of great ornithological interest, especially relevant for the conservation of the white-headed duck in the Iberian Peninsula, both as a wintering and breeding area for the species. Marsh Harrier, Mallard, Great Crested Grebe, Purple Swamphen and Little Grebe are also common. The wetland is visited in winter by several thousand lesser black-backed gulls and black-headed gulls that use the water to clean their plumage. In its waters the pejerrey breeds, a fish that is found in some other parts of the Guadalquivir basin.



Córdoba / Aguilar de la Frontera



Our trail is based on the infrastructures linked to water in the surroundings of the Zóñar lagoon. It is necessary to bear in mind that such a rich source of year-round water, located in the middle of the Cordovan countryside, has historically acted as a kind of oasis for its inhabitants. That is why it has always been surrounded by orchards, irrigation channels, waterwheels, small aqueducts... and springs. But the lagoon has always been closely linked to the life of the inhabitants of Aguilar de la Frontera and surrounding areas.

The Las Fuentes de Zóñar trail starts at the Visitor Centre of the lagoon of the same name, the starting point of a small network of interconnected itineraries that run around this wetland area [1]. After crossing the railway track through a subway, themed with a mural on the birdlife and landscape of the area, there are three routes: the Carrizosa path, on our left, and the Observatory and Springs paths, both on the right. We will head northwest along a lane closed to traffic, which runs along this stretch through an old olive grove which is being turned back to its natural state.



Reforestation of pine forests

As you leave this behind you, you will come to a much more open area with circular or elliptical patches of native vegetation, surrounded by a dense mesh to prevent

rabbits from getting in. This is a curious method of repopulation through the planting of small copses in which holm oaks, carob trees, mastic trees, hawthorns, myrtle, rosemary, kermes oak etc. coexist, and which,

once planted, will naturally and progressively spread to the rest of the territory with a high likelihood of success and, above all, with the whole range of species native to the area.

The Brosque well and the House of Zóñar

If you continue, after a few metres you will come to a crossroads to your left that connects with a straight path leading to the area around the Zóñar lagoon. A few metres from the intersection, you will come across a curious construction to your right: the watering hole of El Brosque [2], which consists of a small hut with a hipped roof that protects the Pozo well, together with six exterior pools. DEL three square and BROSOVE three cylindrical. whose function was to provide water for the livestock that grazed in the

A little further on is the Brosque farmhouse [3], the largest of all the houses built around the lagoon. It is a building that shows how interesting it was to live next to a permanent agricultural, livestock, hunting and leisure resource for its inhabitants. The current state of the structure makes it advisable not to get too close to its walls, which are separated from the road by a wooden protective fence. Between the two is an automated station of the State Meteorological Agency, whose data can be consulted on the Internet in real time.

From here you can decide whether to continue to the observatory [4], where you will be able to see the species of water birds that live or pass through Zóñar at some time of the year, or retrace your steps to continue along the main path that runs parallel to the railway track, a track lined with almond trees, whose explosive flowering turns the route into an attractive walk during the first months of each year.

The springs of Zóñar and Escobar

A little further on you will come to the Fuente de Zóñar (Zoñar Spring) [5], the main surface source of the lagoon which, until



the 1970s, was the most important spring supplying Aguilar de la Frontera. The remains of the small stone aqueduct built for this purpose are still preserved. In addition, archaeological remains of ancient settlers who lived in the shelter of this inexhaustible source of life have been found in the vicinity of the site, some of them from prehistoric times, such as the Iberian settlement of Zúniga. The permanent fall of water from an old iron pipe over a small pool, surrounded by a dense and shady reed bed, allows you to rest and refresh yourself before continuing along the last stretch of the path.

Some 400 metres further on is the Fuente Escobar (Escobar Spring) [6], which is apparently named after a family of market gardeners who lived in the area, as one of the surrounding vegetable gardens and an old



irrigation waterwheel bear the same name. Continuing along the path a little further, you will come to a viewpoint sign indicating the end of the path [7], whose linear nature means you must now turn back towards the Visitor Centre.
