#### LANDSCAPE / VEGETATION

This trail offers a beautiful view over the Sierra de Almijara and the course of the Verde River. The trail crosses a lush area with typical Mediterranean vegetation such as rosemary, esparto grass, diverse species of rockrose and maritime pines. We will also find other trees such as heather, carob trees and kermes oaks. As the trail comes closer to the river, the vegetation changes into oleander, Halimium halimifolium and engojo.



#### HOW TO GET THERE ά

From Otívar: Follow the road A-4050 in the direction of Granada for about 15 km, until a signalled parking area, just30 me away from the start of the trail.

#### **PROFILE OF ROUTE**





# **GREEN CANYONING**

The Verde River is a popular destination for adventure activities. Its canyons, formed by the erosion of limestone rock, are an ideal place to practice canyoning. This place is well worth a visit, and canyoning is a thrilling activity, albeit not entirely free of risk. For this reason, it must be carried out by specialized personnel and with the previous authorisation of the Autonomous Government of Andalusia Both trekking and canyoning are unforgettable experiences that you must not miss!





This is a descending trail across a middle mountain area of the Sierra de Almijara, until arriving at the karst canyons and creeks at the spring of the Verde River.

Along the trail you will be able to enjoy panoramic views over the Almijara range and be surprised by the visit from a specimen of the large population if Iberian ilex that it is home to. It is interesting to appreciate the diverse vegetation all along the trail, with an astonishing number of endemic species. You will also be able to appreciate the transition between the vegetation typical of middle mountain at the beginning of the trail and the riparian vegetation near the end.

## Verde River

The trail continues along a narrow path, which is some sections has been prepared to prevent falls. However, please proceed with caution at all times.





From the Collado de los Chortales (see [1] on map) the trail zigzags down a mountainous slope circling the hill called Cerro

Martos down to the spring of the Verde River. At all times the landscape is lush and verdant. The first noteworthy species are maritime pines, many rosemary bushes and different species of rockroses. Shortly after the beginning of the trail, there is a specific space to admire the landscape surrounding this trail. A panoramic panel with information

on the views will help you to locate all summits of the range that surrounds you [2].

Continue straight on to the Barranco de los

Chortales, where you may admire the waterfall known as Cascada de los Árboles Petrificados or Chorrera de los Palos, and



the first ponds of green waters (hence the name of Verde River, "verde" meaning "green"in Spanish) can be observed.

### Cascada de los Árboles Petrificados waterfall

This is a really unique waterfall [3]. Inside it there are long, clear rocks, which look very much like tree trunks. And, basically, that is what they used to be. Originally, these forms were trees that fell either naturally or due to fires, and were stuck in the limestone rocks. Over the years, the limestone dissolved in water accumulated on them turning the tress into a highly porous rock known as tufa. Dissolved limestone material penetrated the trunks, causing the organic matter to decay and leaving the trunk hollow. The resulting rock maintains the shape of the tree trunk from which it was originated.

Pools and waterfalls, a canyoning paradise

Your next stop shall be at the middle point of the trail, just at the spring of the Verde River, by which is the Fuente de las Cabrerizas spring [4]. Shortly afterwards, you will reach a series of pools along a cliff; they are the spillway of the reservoir called Pantaneta de la Cueva de Funes [5], which is located uphill and discharges in this side of the mountain. All along the way,



you will probably have had fourlegged company: agile specimens of Iberian ilex may have been interested in you.

You are now close

to the end of the trail. The last highlight is the Cascada de la Cueva waterfall, known by some as the "Y" [6], which creates the pool called Poza Central. After a few metres, our way finishes.
