

From Ouesada take the A-6206 southbound towards Pozo Alcón. After about 13 km we find the Sanctuary of Tiscar on our left. The trail starts at this point.

PARKING

There is a carpark with some 15 places at the start of the trail.


PUBLIC TRANSPORT

THE LEGEND OF THE VIRGIN

According to legend, the Moors who inhabited the castle of Tiscar believed that the Christians' insistence on conquering their fortress was because they wanted to recover an image of the Virgin that they possessed. It was therefore thrown from the tower into the river gorge. But, magically, the image reappeared before them again and again.


Their chief, Mahomad Andon, enraged, smashed it to pieces with his cutlass. When the Christians conquered the castle, they found out what had happened, and when they found the pieces, they took them to Toledo to repair them. But, once again, the Virgin miraculously reappeared in Tiscar.



Legends such as these inspired the verses of Antonio Machado who, in 1917, was impressed by the diminutive stature of the virgin:



«In the Sierra de Quesada there is a giant eagle, greenish, black and golden; its wings are always open. It is made of stone and does not get tired. Past Puerto Logallops through the clouds. It never tires: it is made of rock. In the hollow of the ravine, the fallen horseman can be seen, raising his arms to the sky. His arms are made of granite. And where no one climbs there is a laughing eagle with its the Virgen de la Sierra».



In this rugged and secluded spot in the south of the Sierra de Cazorla, we can find this small spot where cultural and natural wealth come together. The action of water on the limestone rock over the millennia has created this narrowing of the River Tíscar, which looks like a cave due to the narrowness of its course. This place was really desired during the Reconquest by both Muslims and Christians, as its watchtower dominated the passage through these mountain ranges. From that time we have wonderful legends about conquests and apparitions that add to the charm of this beautiful place.

Sanctuary of Tiscar

To access our path we take a road that comes off the A-6206 to the right in the direction of Pozo Alcón, after leaving the tunnel under the Sanctuary of Tíscar.

It was the first Christians, after the Reconquest, who built this Marian temple. Centuries passed and it became a place of pilgrimage. Next to its chapel, a hamlet was built to provide lodging for the weary pilgrims. Subsequently, after successive restoration and enlargement works, it can be found as we see it today.



If we follow its winding route for about five hundred metres we will reach the beginning of the path (check [1] on the map), where we can find a car park where we can stop it.

Descent to the pool

The route is short but intense and, although it is short, we must be careful not to slip, due to the numerous stairs and the humidity of the place.



At the very beginning there are some stairs that lead down to a landing. For a while, we will have to crouch down to pass about 10 metres of a tunnel through which a ditch passes. Further on, we will find some stairs on the left hand side, from here the cave is already clearly visible. We can either venture down these stairs and stop again at a viewpoint [2], or continue down to the final platform.

The Cave of the Virgin

In front of us is the image of the Virgin [3] among the mosses and ferns, surrounded by candles and other relics that,



according to tradition, only the young men of Belerda can bring up to place.

The cave presents a combination of light and dark, water and whimsical stone shapes (stalactites, stalagmites and columns). The vegetation blends with these elements, creating unique environments. It is known as the Cave of the Virgin of Tíscar because, according to tradition, the Virgin appeared there in 1319 to the kinglet of Tíscar, Mahomad Abdón.

The castle, of small size, is of Muslim origin, dating from the 14th century. It is perched on a fine ridge of the Peña Negra. It is really complicated and dangerous to reach it. This difficulty was still evident when it was restored a few years ago. According to legend, when the castle was reconquered, the squire of the feat, Pere Hidalgo, was granted a golden star on a red background on his coat of arms.
